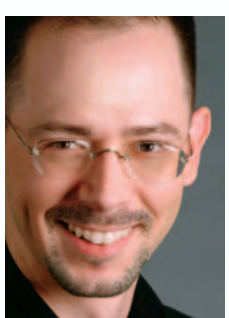
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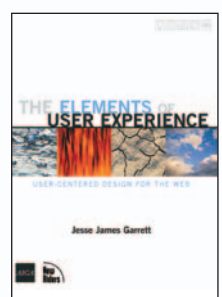

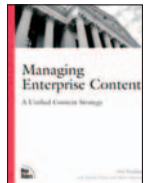

Full-Day Seminar: Small Steps to Single Sourcing (OCT 6, \$339)

Instructor: Neil Perlin, Online Help & XML Consultant

Audience: Technical communicators and managers interested in understanding single sourcing issues

Description: "Single sourcing" is a hot topic in technical communication, but what exactly is it? At a simple level, it's nothing more than creating online and hardcopy material with RoboHelp or FrameMaker/WebWorks. But single sourcing goes deeper than that, with a company's processes and strategic direction affecting how material is created and managed, how material is structured to support automated single sourcing, what standards that material follows in order to ensure future extensibility, and so on. This larger picture of single sourcing is the subject of this workshop.

The workshop first discusses single sourcing's environment, focusing on strategic, managerial, political, and organizational issues. The workshop then describes information structuring, focusing on the highlights of a seven-step process that consists of defining and codifying the types of material you support, the types of conversions, and the structure, information types, and appearances of those types of material. The goal of this workshop is to leave attendees with specific steps to take back to their companies in order to begin planning for large-scale single sourcing.



Half-Day Seminar: Connecting Help to an Application (OCT 6, \$169)

Instructor: David Locke, Certified RoboHelp Consultant & Trainer

Audience: Help authors who need to understand how to link context-sensitive help

Description: The most effective form of online Help is that Help provided within the context of a software application. Although Help authors can create Help as a solitary task, the creation of context-sensitive Help (CSH) requires Help authors and developers to work closely together to produce good context-sensitive help. We will review several models of linked user assistance to see how context-sensitivity works in different environments (Windows, HTML, others), and to see how those environments affect design choices.

We will also look at the functions and constraints of different authoring tools, and work several examples of CSH (at the code example level) in different environments. We'll discuss various implementation elements, including API calls, Web-based links, Java, and others. Finally, we'll discuss several techniques to help evaluate the success of linked user assistance.
